Women are experts at gossiping, and they always talk about trivial things, or at least that's what men have always thought. However, some new research suggests that when women talk to women their conversations are far from frivolous, and cover many more topics (up to 40 subjects) than when men talk to other men. Women's conversations range from health to their houses, from politics to fashion, from films to family, from education to relationship problems. Football is notably absent. Men tend to have a more limited range of subjects, the most popular being work, sport, jokes, cars and women.

According to Professor Petra Boynton, a psychologist at University College London, who interviewed over 1000 women, women also tend to move quickly from one subject to another in conversation, whereas men usually stick to one subject for longer periods of time. At work, this difference can be an advantage for men, where they can put personal or separate matters aside and concentrate fully on the topic being discussed. On the other hand, it also means that they sometimes find it hard to concentrate when several things have to be discussed at the same time in a meeting .

Professor Boynton also says that men and women chat for different reasons. In social situations, women use conversation to solve problems and reduce stress while men chat with each other to have a laugh or to swap opinions.

Same planet, different worlds

Have you ever heard a seemingly normal woman saying something like, "I don't know what I do to turn men off. I seem to push them away. Maybe I'm too demanding, or not demanding enough. Men are so confusing."

And it could be that very same day that you hear a seemingly normal man, unrelated to the first woman, ^{بشنگی} complaining: "I don't get women. I must be doing something wrong. Women are so hard to understand." When men and women get together, there are, in effect, two worlds—his and hers. They have different ^{عادات} values, ^{أولويات} priorities, and habits. They play by different rules. ^{علماء} Scientists have come to accept that a few ^{أساسي} fundamental differences between men and women are biological. It turns out that men's and women's ^{أدمغة} brains, for example, are not only different, but the way we use them differs too. Women have larger connections and more frequent ^{تفاعل} interaction between their brain's left and right hemispheres. This accounts for women's ability to have better verbal skills and intuition. Men, on the other hand, have greater brain hemisphere ^{عزلة} separation, which explains their skills for ^{عجبر} abstract reasoning and visual-spatial ^{ذكاء} intelligence. Poet Robert Bly describes women's brains as a "superhighway" of connection while men's brains connections are compared to a "little crooked country road." Different habits of men and women are explained by different roles in the process of evolution. Although life ^{ظروف} conditions have changed, both men and women tend to follow their biological programs. Men tend to retain a firm sense of direction—they need to ^{تتبع} trace the game, catch it, and find the way home, while women have a better peripheral vision that helps them to see what's happening around the house, to spot an ^{مقترب} approaching danger, to notice changes in the children's behavior and appearance. Men's brains are programmed to

^{صيد} **hunting**, which explains their ^{ضيق} **narrow** range of ^{رؤية} **vision**, while women's brains are able to ^{يقدر} **decipher** a wider range of information when entering a room, men look for ^{مخارج} **exits**, ^{تقدير} **estimating** a possible ^{تهديد} **threat**, and ways of escape, while women pay attention to the guests' faces to find

out who they are and how they feel. Men are able to sort out information and archive it in their head. Women tend to 'rewind' the information over and over again. The only way to stop thinking of the problems is to talk it over. When a woman shares her problems with a man, she is not looking for solutions—she needs someone to listen to her. Men prefer strident noises, hard handshakes, and red color. They are better at solving technical problems.

Women have a ^{أكثر حدة} **sharper** ear, they use more words while talking, and are better at completing tasks ^{بشكل مستقل} **independently**. Based on these biologically explained differences, some psychological distinctions between men and women can be established:

-Men grasp a situation as a whole and think globally, while women think locally, relying on details and nuances.

-Men are builders and creators. They take risks and experiment, while women select the most ^{قيّم} **valuable** knowledge and pass it over to the next generation. -Men are more independent in their thoughts and actions, while women are more willing to follow the ideas suggested by

others. -Women's self-appraisal is lower than that of men. Women tend to ^{ينتقد} **criticize** themselves, while men are more ^{رأى} **satisfied** with their own ^{أداء} **performance**.

-Men and women have different sources of ^{مصدر} **satisfaction**. For men it's ^{مهنة} **career** and ^{ازدهار} **prosperity**, while women value family and kids.

-Men have a pronounced need to ^{تحقق} **fulfill** their goals, and women rank relationships with others first.

-Men get sick twice as often as women, although women tend to be more concerned about their health.

-Women endure pain and monotonous ^{عمل} work better than men. All the above gets even more confusing, if we take into account that 15 to 20% of men happen to have a female type of brains, and about 10% of women have a male type of brains, which means that some ^{نسبة مئوية} percentage of men and women, no matter how small it seems, are ^{جزئياً} partially programmed to the behavior and way of thinking of the opposite gender. "Okay, I understand the problem", you are saying to yourself, but -"what's the solution"? That depends on whether you are a woman or a man.

30 days on the minimum wage

Spurlock, who is most famous for Supersize Me, his film about the dangers of eating junk food, became ^{محبط} frustrated that few people know about ^{فقير} poverty in America. He and his ^{مخطوبة} fiancée Alex decided to film an ^{تجربة} experiment – they'd give up their jobs for a month and try to live on the ^{ألمر الحد الأدنى} minimum wage. The resulting documentary, which was filmed reality-show-style using a handheld camera, contains a powerful, social message about the growing gap between rich and poor in the USA. The couple travel to Columbus, Ohio, one of the poorest ^{قذرة} cities in the USA. The only ^{شقة} apartment that they can afford to rent is filthy, in a dangerous area, and has no heating or furniture. Alex begins working as a dishwasher, whilst Morgan does building work with no safety equipment. ^{معدات} Neither of them earns more than the minimum wage. It's difficult to watch Morgan and Alex struggling in such terrible conditions. A ^{مؤسسة خيرية} charity gives them some furniture for free, but they have to live without heating, TV and telephone. They're ^{متعبون} exhausted and freezing all the time and begin to argue about money. The couple interview people in the same situation and listen to their stories. It's difficult to imagine, but these people have lived on minimum wage for ^{عقود} decades and many have children. When Alex becomes ill and Morgan badly injures his wrist, they go to a free clinic for the poor, but can't see a doctor because of long queues. People there say that without free ^{طبي} medical care they'd die. After thirty days, the experiment has failed. They have spent over \$1,000 more than they have earned. The couple are shocked – they can go back to their comfortable life in New York, but what if they couldn't? How would they continue to survive? *The minimum wage in the US today is \$5.15 per hour.
